

Nouns

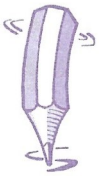


Nouns are words that **name** things. **Common nouns** are the words that we use every day to talk about objects, animals, places and people. They name different kinds of things.

For example: table pencil dog rabbit school park girl man

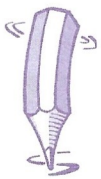
Proper nouns are the special names we give to a **particular** person, animal or place.

For example: Rachel Lee Tiddles Champion Manchester

Did you know...



The idea of proper nouns, or special names, was invented hundreds of years ago when people realised that sometimes an ordinary common noun was not enough. For example, as long as there was only one town in the area, then the word *town* was fine – everyone knew which place it referred to. But as soon as there was more than one town nearby, people needed a way of knowing which town was which. So each town was given its own special name and place names were invented.

Nouns



When you are writing, common nouns are sometimes not very useful. Some common nouns cover lots of different sorts of things.

For example, if you use the words a man

he might be... a farmer... a policeman... a pop star.

When you are writing, you need to be precise. Choose nouns carefully. Some nouns don't give the reader a clear picture.

For example: The **man** ran out of the **building**.

What sort of man was he? What was the building like?

The reader gets a much clearer picture if you write:

The **fire-fighter** ran out of the **tower block**.

or The **robber** ran out of the **bank**.
