We respect the rules and laws of our society.

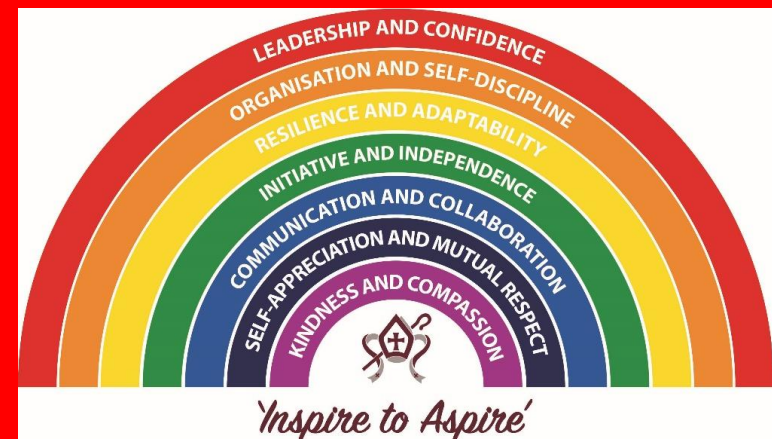
Laws help us to be safe, and happy.
