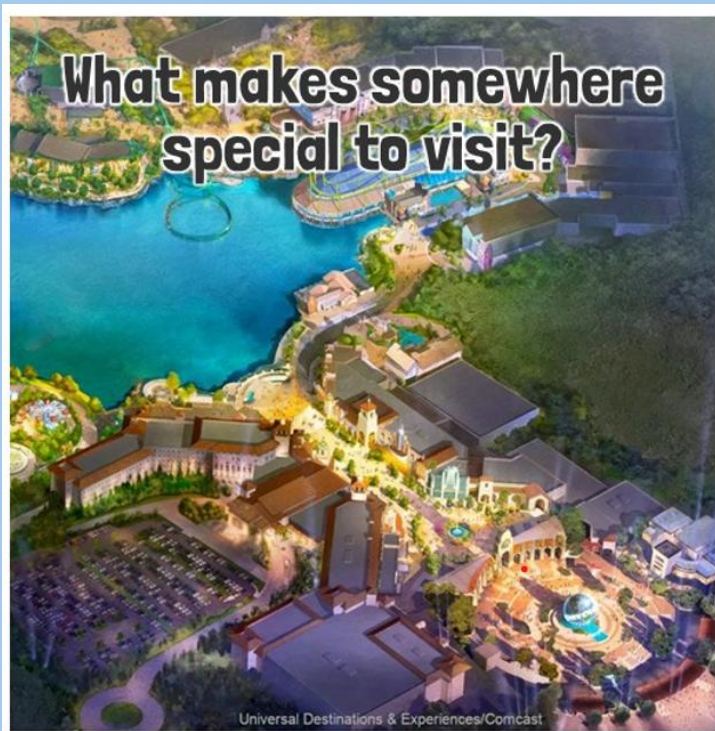


BRITISH VALUES

We all have rights and responsibilities.

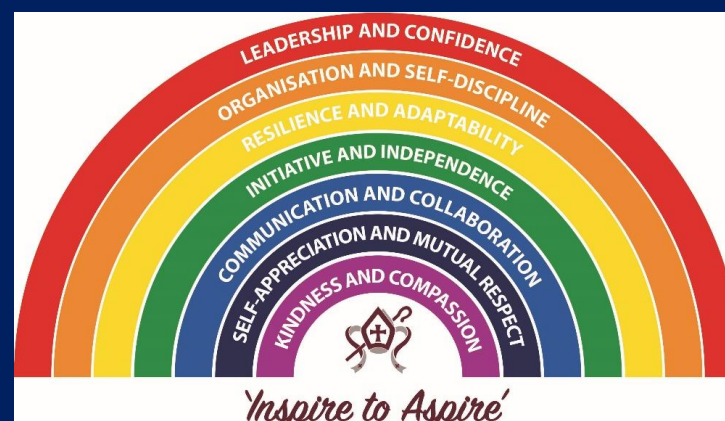
Our rights can change if we don't act responsibly.

SELF-APPRECIATION AND MUTUAL RESPECT

What can we learn from this?

Recognising that we each enjoy different places helps children (and adults) value their own preferences. A new theme park could offer a variety of attractions that cater to different interests — whether someone loves adventure, storytelling, culture, or calm spaces — encouraging visitors to feel confident and proud of what they enjoy. By acknowledging that others might like different places or experiences, we practice mutual respect. When building a theme park, developers must consider the diversity of the people who will visit. That means creating spaces that reflect different interests, backgrounds, and needs. Involving the public in the design or simply being aware of these differences helps foster a sense of belonging, appreciation, and respect among all visitors.
