In the news this week

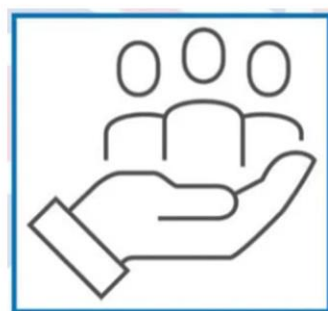

To celebrate its Diamond Jubilee (60 years) this year, the competition has also introduced a new Impact Award to recognise conservation successes and stories of hope.

Together, we are one community.

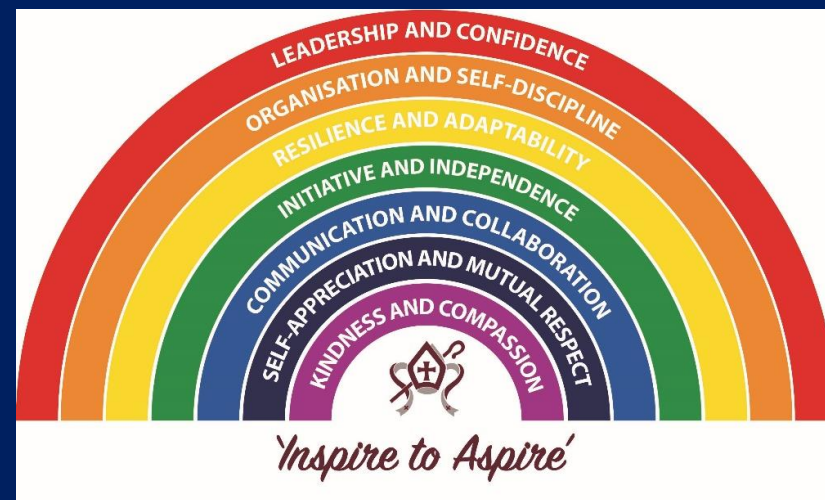
We care for each other and respect each other's culture and beliefs.
